
Mayan women of Guatemala live in the mountain villages of their ancestors, weaving colorful textiles using traditional back-strap looms.


#### DESERT CORRIDORS

## **GREGG GIFT AFFIRMS LOVE**

Gary and Vera Gregg loved the Sonoran Desert. Their recent legacy gift will transform Tohono Chul in the form of the newly constructed pavilion.

The Greggs met while working together in Northeastern Ohio. They were inseparable. After many visits, they made Tucson their home in 2014. Vera loved cacti from the time she was a child. The Arizona desert felt like home. The native cacti were just like the ones her mother grew in Ohio (indoors in the winter!).

The two spent long full days at Tohono Chul. Vera was an avid birder and they soaked in all they could learn about their new desert home. The gardens inspired their own landscape. It became a haven for hummingbirds, butterflies and the roadrunner.

Gary and Vera cared for one another as they valiantly battled cancer. Gary died of advanced prostate cancer in late 2015. Vera's 9-year fight with breast cancer ended just 4 months later. Their estate gift to Tohono Chul ensures they will live on by enriching the lives of all visitors.

The pavilion will honor their memory and serve as a testament to their love of each other, the Sonoran Desert and Tohono Chul.

## CHILES, CHOCOLATE & DAY OF THE DEAD!


FRIDAY & SATURDAY OCTOBER 27 & OCTOBER 28 FROM 9 A.M. - 4 P.M.

When the Spanish reached the New World, they found Aztecs and Mayas incorporating cultivated chiles — *Capiscum annum* — into their daily lives, using them to spice up meals and cure illnesses. North of Mexico, indigenous peoples harvested the wild chiltepin for flavoring, ancestor of the chiles we grow, enjoy and celebrate around the world.

Not so much to the liking of Spanish explorers was the bitter chocolate drink of the Aztecs, but once blended with honey or cane sugar, they understood why cacao (*Theobroma cacao*) was considered to have magical, even divine properties — we'll drink to that!

For our annual salute to the fiery chile and decadent chocolate, over 30 food and craft vendors fill the grounds with tempting chile- and chocolate-enhanced foodstuffs, and chile-inspired crafts. Look for cooking demonstrations by the chefs of the Garden Bistro, chile and chocolate beers and wines, and musical entertainment with a Latin beat. As a special treat, the Garden Bistro is serving dinner Friday evening, October 27!

And in conjunction with our biennial exhibit, we are also celebrating another enduring tradition of the borderlands, Día de los Muertos with personal ofrendas (altars) from local artists and schools, a community altar inviting participants to leave recuerdos

The pavilion is a 4,744 square foot gathering place. It is a world-class architectural facility. It will provide shelter and protection, but it will be open to the grounds, integrated into the gardens. Designed for efficiency and conservation—its curved roof will harvest rainwater for the gardens. Energy from the sun will power fans, lights and heaters.

It will allow Gathering in the Garden for an audience of

420. 240 people can gather at tables to eat. Day or night, the space is flexible for meetings, children's activities, concerts, theater, music, dance, classes, film, services or celebrations. It fills a space that is currently not in active use and preserves most of the existing plantings.

Your gift to the Gathering in the Garden will keep Tohono Chul warm and welcoming. You can ensure that ALL can gather in the garden.


